#### A WORD FROM PASTOR DIANE

And I am also thinking about how this is the time of year where we are all supposed to be joyful and bright at the same time. How are we supposed to do it all?! There is a lot of pressure on us as individuals every single year in every single season. Be our best. Make things happen. Make it the best year, the best event, the best us yet. It's exhausting!

We have been feeling this pressure here at Zion too. We have been doing the hard work as staff, committees, and Council to be cognizant of our expenditures and think creatively about how to do ministry in the upcoming year as costs increase and perhaps as the world sees church as even less important. We don't have any quick fixes to these issues. Our understanding of God and our

community needs don't jive with making ourselves flashy and adding a coffee shop to our building. Sometimes the things we decide to do work and sometimes they don't. And there is the reality here too- we can't do it all.

In all of our diligent evaluations and plans, multiple leaders and staff have expressed an important sentiment they are feeling under all this pressure: we ALL need to do this work. It isn't just staff, committees, or council who have to make the ministry of Zion happen. Every single one of us does. Every single one of us does. I will type it one more time- every single one of us does. We can't just come in and punch our worship timecard, throw our offering in the plate, and dust our hands off and call it good. Is that really giving with our whole heart? And yes, we all have different abilities and some of us cannot do what we used to, but there are even little ways we can each



we are doing to make ministry possible.

I plead with you to think about how greatly blessed we are to be called together as a community at Zion. We cannot do it all alone and because we have each other, we do not have to. Please think about how you can help when we have an event that promotes the church and then do it! Think about how you might give more of yourself to the ministry here and then do it! Let us continue to ALL work together to share Christ's love, grow in faith, and serve others.

# A WORD FROM PASTOR MATT

Ever since I have come back to the office following the birth of James and Joseph, I found it very difficult to keep up on all the emails and text messages. It usually takes me all week to get my emails below a double digit number, but come Monday morning, that number quickly grows to 80 and 90 emails. I try very hard to not check my emails or my cell phone on my day off in order to have a break from the work. However being a good millennial, I feel guilty about this practice.

I have learned that there's actually a term for all of this. It is called Digital Debt.
Every time I open up my phone and see the amount of emails and text messages that I need to return, I feel this weight upon my shoulders grow heavier and heavier because I know there are people on the other side of those emails and text messages awaiting my reply. I feel that



weight but at the same time there are other pressing matters such as pastoral care and ministry planning that for me, take priority. Do I spend an hour reading and responding to emails or do I spend that same hour providing pastoral care? Being a good millennial with a hearty protestant work ethic, the answer to that question is yes.

As we approach the month of December, I am feeling more and more the pressure and stress of all the extra work that needs to be done on top of the other regular work of checking emails, replying to text messages, returning phone calls, and all the other duties assigned as a pastor. I am not at all complaining about my job but there are days when I long for Jesus to return not so that he can fix things but so that I can get a break from the email. Perhaps you feel this way as well.

I realized a couple years ago that we put four weeks of work into just three weeks during the month of December. I love the season after Christmas (the 12 days after Christmas) but it is often neglected in the life of the church because we are all so exhausted from all the "getting ready." Personally, I don't have it in me to preach or study on any of the feast days that occur between December 25th and January 6th because I am so busy.

This is not a new phenomena. I have read numerous pastors diaries from the 17 and 1800s and these pastors would say these things about December and Christmas. There just isn't enough time to fit everything in that we want to do or that we think we need to do. For the last 12 years in my December newsletter articles, I have said something to the effect that we need to slow down this Advent and Christmas. And every year, none of us, not even me, heed that advice or prescription. Perhaps this year I should stop giving that advice and simply say, "Don't worry. Jesus is still coming."

Ever since we started having kids, Christmas has not been the same. Something always goes wrong that usually involves more stress than was actually merited. And yet even in the midst of everything going wrong, Jesus shows up. Last year, pipes were bursting, electronics were getting fried, and our building was very cold due to a power outage and a severe cold front. Yet somehow, Jesus showed up. I don't know what the season of Advent and Christmas holds for any of us this year. All I know is this—Jesus will show up.

#### A Day Off from School!



## Being the Church...

#### **Interview with Bobby Staples by Mary Ann Marcantonio**



Worship at Zion has centered itself around music and has for nearly three centuries. So important was Music, that the earliest worshipers in 1783, even when money was very scarce, made sure that an organ occupied the west side of the building. We know little else about that early building but they felt it was the utmost importance to record this information so that future generations would know that organ music existed in our early congregational beginnings. Today, the fourth organ installed at Zion stirs us to worship. Many organist have filled the position to lead the congregation and the fruits of their labors live on in our current organist, Bobby Staples.

Bobby's interest in the organ began with a simple question... to see the organ. He was curious and then encouraged by his mother to walk up to John Seachrist, a very accomplished

musician and our organist at the time. Service had just ended, and a shy young man took those first steps to a long organ career.

Bobby began his organ study with John soon after he took those first steps. After only a few months, John knew that Bobby had both the desire and the ability to be a great organist and took an interest in his music career and opened the door to many opportunities for him. It was only 6 months into his study that John asked Bobby to play Silent Night at the Christmas Eve Service. This was the beginning of his love of organ music. In October 2011, Bobby's mentor passed away and left big shoes to fill. And just one year later, Bobby was playing with organists in and around Frederick County at a concert sanctioned by the American Guild of Organists.

Bobby's music career began in a most unusual way. In his youth, (I laughed at this) Bobby had taught himself to play the piano through learning chords and where the chord was located on the piano keys. After several years he sought formal lessons.

While in high school, Bobby played the piano in the jazz band and the trumpet for the concert band. Upon high school graduation, Bobby attended Hood College for 4 years where he earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in music and his Bachelor of Science degree in computer science. He studied the Art of Organ Performance under the world renowned organist, Dr. Wayne L. Wold. While pursuing his music interests after college graduation, Bobby earned his Master's Degree in cybersecurity at John Hopkins University. This interest in computers opened the door to a career in the federal government at the National Institute of Standards and Technology where he is employed as a Systems Administrator.

A passion of Bobby's is transcribing music not usually heard played on an organ and by doing so hopes to bring a new interest in playing or listening to organ music. He enjoys using the latest computer technology in his musical endeavors.

If you enjoy riding some of the back country roads of Frederick County, you may be lucky to see Bobby riding his motorcycle. But lately not alone. His new found love, Avery Pettigrew, will be close behind. Avery herself is quite an accomplished musician and on several occasions has shared her talents here at Zion during worship. She plays French horn with several local professional orchestras, including the Maryland Symphony, the Virginia Symphony, the Mid-Atlantic Symphony, and teaches both privately as well as on the faculty of Frostburg State University. Marriage plans are set for them early next year, January 27th. Congratulations to you both!

Besides playing the organ at the 11 o'clock service, he also directs Zion's choir and Zion's handbell choir.

I asked Bobby what his dream for Zion is and his answer did not surprise me...to start the children's choir back up again. Since COVID, the youth choir has been inactive but hopefully that can change.

And just as what others have done for him, he now is doing the same...teaching Addison the organ. The amazing thing about "being the church", as our life ends, the fruits of their labors never die. Just as Bobby has learned from John, John learned from Mary Hoffman and so on. Each of these very accomplished musicians got to see the fruits of their labors through their investment in their successor. Our talents, no matter what they may be, are not meant for us to store up but to invest in the lives of others. This takes work, a commitment to be involved in developing the labors of others. Sharing our talents is a responsibility and being a good steward of God's gifts. In return, our talents are multiplied as we work to develop others. As we share our talents, they reflect back as to what we treasure most and by doing so, we are invited to "Come share your Master's joy" (Matthew 25:21). What gift is God's Spirit inspiring you




