A WORD FROM PASTOR DIANE

As a pastor, celebrating the major festival holidays can be guite challenging. We are very conscious of planning and executing worship that is meaningful and memorable which takes a lot of behind-thescenes work with various groups. Even with wonderful and supportive teams doing their part to make special services happen, there is still a lot of concentrated effort and stress that takes a toll. With our focus on the logistics and execution, truly enjoying the meaning and reality of the holiday does not really set in until the week after.

This is definitely the case for me every Christmas, but I didn't realize until this year how true this also was for Easter. Where we have some special services weekly for Advent leading up to three Christmas Eve services, Lenten midweek services plus the back to back Triduum services before Easter Sunday services again take a great deal of concentrated effort and energy. This year the week following Easter gave me a moment to pause and rejoice not because all the planning had come to fruition but rather, to sit, myself, in the story of resurrection and wonder what this past Lent meant for my faith, moving forward.

Throughout Lent I had been trying to focus more on turning to and growing in relationship with God daily and less to all the mindless scrolling and distractions I choose to pass time, but was that it? Check that box off for trying to do Lent this year and move on to the next thing? Did I grow closer to following and diminishing the distractions that keep me from strengthening my relationship with God? The honest answer: no. How does that make me feel? Judgmental of myself- yes, a little. Like I want to give up because I'll never get it right- this time, no. I say this time because this hasn't been the first Lent I did not accomplish what I had hoped and said forget it and ignored what I had hoped would come to fruition. This year, I am thinking about what I learned by not growing more into my spiritual discipline. Why at times couldn't I stop the mindless scrolling and turn to the devotional reading? Was there something else in those moments I could do instead that my mind could handle? What am I missing when I don't stop in my overwhelmed state to talk to God? What is it that I am specifically seeking when I turn to that mindless scrolling? Is there another way I can tune into God that my overwhelmed brain can handle versus my devotional



reading? What about some contemplative prayer?

Entering into the season of Easter, we are welcomed into the good news of being brought from all those ways we daily choose death and distraction into life abundant. Death and separation are no longer the final words for us. We don't have to live like they are. Even though we may still choose those things that keep us from God, we are welcome to choose and keep trying to choose the life and relationship our Creator wants for us. We don't have to think there is no hope for us. God does have hope for us providing a redemption from these things through Jesus and the Spirit's encouragement to keep us connected and keep us being formed into God's holy people. If you feel like Lent was a lost cause, I want to encourage you to think in this season of abundant life how you can continue to grow closer to God. The call to connect hasn't stopped just because the paraments have changed.

On Being the Church...

An interview with Jamie Derr by Mary Ann Marcantonio



Farmlands once occupied a great deal of real estate in the Middletown Valley and they are slowly disappearing. In spite of this trend, the Derr family has chosen this as their life's occupation. It is hard work, never ending hours, little time to enjoy the niceties like vacations or even a night out, but for the Derr family, contentment in life is found in doing what they love...and that's farming. Jamie described her early years as a "fairytale life" growing up on a dairy farm. A fairytale life to some of us may seem like a privileged life but Jamie explained it as having devoted parents, loving siblings, hard work with no regrets and being raised in a home where everyone was welcomed...to many less fortunate, this does

sound like a fairytale!

I asked Jamie, "Why did you choose farming?" She was very clear that she did not choose farming but God called her to be a farmer. She is a fourth generation dairy farmer and it seemed like a natural choice to make but God was very clear. She followed his call and he has opened up ways that Jamie never dreamed of. Following the Lord was not always easy for Jamie and Chris. When it was time for them to begin their farming operation, the economy was not doing very well. They approached two different banks and were declined a loan. They were even told they were being crazy to consider it. But God never calls you to follow without providing, and so persistence was in order. Another loan application was submitted, and Jamie said her happiest moment in life (outside her family), came when they received the call their loan was approved.

Jamie's faith began when she was very young. In fact, she calls herself a cradle Christian. Sunday was go to church day and attend Sunday School and it was expected. There was no fussing! The friendships she made in those classes are lifelong friends. But the foundation of faith was born and would serve her well.

In following her call to farm, she attended Delaware Valley College with hopes of earning a degree in horticulture but switched her path to Agriculture Education. Jamie's older brother had gone to Delaware and had friends that she had already met. It was through these acquaintances that she met Christopher. She had asked him where he was from and he said Middletown. Her quick response, "Middletown where?" He replied, "Maryland." She told him, "I know where Middletown is, I'm from Boonsboro." This conversation led to the beginning of how God brought them together. At school they lived a distance apart but managed to make it work and soon were married. They now have two boys, Levi, age 13 and Zack, age 10 and enjoy the adventures that come with two young and active boys.

For believers, challenges are always waiting in the wings, and this was true for Jamie in a troubling way.

Jamie opened up and exposed a weakness (and God was going to use this to show His strength in her). She suffered with anxieties most of her life, but they progressively got worse. She would put on a happy face for everyone and deep inside her joy was being eaten away. She would pray, "God please take away the crazy" yet she continued to struggle with deep anxieties for two years. She found the strength each day to lift herself up off the couch and do what needed to be done. She was diagnosed with Chronic Sinusitis which heightened her anxieties and the doctor urged her to consider medication to help with the added stress caused by her physical health. Not feeling any better and as a last resort, she began taking the medication. For Jamie, it was the struggle between believing in the power of prayer for help or relying on medication to get better. The taking of the medication seemed to be showing a lack of confidence in the power of prayer. But Jamie admitted, sometimes God's help comes in the most unexpected way...God was sending help but not in the way she expected. Today she uses her experience of her suffering to be a source of encouragement to others and claims to be the happiest she has ever been. As we talked, she was up to her elbows in dirt, preparing and transplanting her seedlings to take root with genuine enthusiasm and joy. She believes she is living the dream... she has a beautiful family, her farm, flowers and more friends than she would have ever expected. What more could you want!

Jamie is involved in many ministries at church. She leads the Welcome and Engagement Ministry Team that was instrumental in refurbishing the rear ramp of the church and changes the flower boxes out seasonally. She teaches Sunday School to the young. She loves being a part of Zion's ministries and cheerfully serves but her joy is found in gardening and her flowers, a passion she learned from her grandmother.

Being the church is not just showing up on Sunday morning. It is what we do with the other hours of the week. Jamie recognizes today that all along God was preparing her to use her passions to help others and share a little joy. The Derr/Burrier families have resided on Valley Ho farm for decades and has been a welcoming place for many friends over the years. Her love of flowers has inspired her to begin a "Faith Flowers Fitness" program. She has hosted the Women's Bible Study on Sunday evenings at the farm for several years now where women are learning to balance faith and life. Whether casting a line into the pond or a visit to the milking parlor, having a conversation with a friend or just watching a crazy dog chase the geese into the pond, a warm welcome and a portion of peacefulness is always at hand!

Stations of the Cross


Since the late 4th century, the Church has used the Stations of the Cross liturgy to help followers remember the last events of our Lord's life before his death. During 2020, the church was not able to have in-person worship due to the pandemic but turned to ancient liturgies like the Stations of the Cross to help people remember the story of how God saved the world through the cross. After a few years of being in the weather, we had our stations redone, simplified, and ready for many more years of service. It is our hope next year to have them out a bit earlier in Lent for everyone to use and enjoy.

Palm Sunday

It was a bit chilly this year as Palm Sunday fell on the third Sunday in March. We had enjoyed some unseasonably warm weather leading up to Sunday morning, but the warm weather was replaced by a cold, strong wind from the East. Nonetheless, we persevered at the 9 a.m. service and began outside in the cold for a very short procession as we welcomed our Lord and those who came to worship the one who comes in the name of the Lord.















The Three Days—Holy Week 2024

Maundy Thursday

Holy week is unique in that it takes three days to tell the story of God overcoming the grave. Part 1 began on Maundy Thursday. We gathered downstairs for dinner prepared by the Council. Afterwards, we made our way upstairs for worship. Maundy



Thursday is the weirdest of the Three Days in that the focus is on the last commandments that our Lord gave the church: Confession and Forgiveness, foot washing, and Holy Communion. Most of us don't like to have our feet touched but the command from our Lord is clear: "Unless you wash one another's feet, you have no share with me." In most traditional Maundy Thursday services, you would simply focus on the

three commands or mandatumes, but we know people experience things differently and learn through different means. So, this year, we added a number of different stations that people could explore and experience during the washing of feet. These stations included a sensory table, coloring station, journaling station, and prayer and anointing station. Everyone really got into the stations and we had over 90 people participate in worship that night. The liturgy ended with the Stripping of the Altar which lead us into part 2.



Feel free to touch, smell, look, and feel anything on this table. Each of these items are either used in either worship tonight or is a part of the passion story.





Good Friday

Good Friday's focus is on reading the Passion according to St. John, prayer, and reflection. What is unique about our Liturgy is that it is mostly led by the congregation as a reminder that we all are active participants in the passion. Our Good Friday liturgy is steeped in old traditions dating back to the 3rd and 4th centuries. The service begins with a large candle being carried in but hidden throughout the liturgy. It is brought back into the sanctuary and left on the altar near the cross at the end. The words, "We adore you O Christ and we bless you. For by your holy Cross you have redeemed the world." remind us of the hope that still is to come on Easter. The Good Friday Liturgy doesn't end on a note of despair but on hope and the single lit, remaining candle reminds us that Part 3 happens in less than 24 hours.



Easter Vigil

On Saturday night, in joyful expectation we gathered to join in a tradition that dates back to the first century—the Easter Vigil. On the night before Easter, the Church would gather to read scripture starting at Genesis 1 to hear the salvific story of God. The liturgy moves from one location to another and along the way, we follow the Pascal Candle. Eventually, we made our way back to the Sanctuary and joyfully proclaimed, "Alleluia, Christ is risen!"

Easter Morning

Almost 400 people joined us on Easter Sunday to shout Alleluia and praise God for the gift of the Resurrection. Our Christian Fellowship Ministry provided a breakfast of coffee and items that could be eaten in the Social Room or taken togo, but we were delighted to see so many people stay and join in conversation with one another. We had two great worship services on Easter morning. Matt and the Worship Team sang their hearts out to a packed congregation. The Orchestra and choir sounded fantastic as always. Thank you to everyone who made Easter Sunday so special!





Community Easter Egg Hunt

On March 30, over 80 people filled the Social Room to go hunting for some special eggs left by the Easter Bunny. But we couldn't just have a massive Easter Egg hunt...We also had cookie decorating, crafts to make, popcorn to eat, story time, and a community service station where we put together buckets full of cleaning supplies donated by Zion to the Middletown Valley Food Bank.




Donations can be dropped off outside the chapel or taken directly to the Food Bank on Wednesdays from 1-3 p.m.



The Bishop's Blotter—reflections from the Rev. William J. Gohl Jr.



Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." – Matthew 28.18-20

Editor's note: While we normally do not rerun other articles, this one by Bishop Gohl was too good not to share it again.

On Saturday evening, I had a small part in the Maryland Opera's production of Puccini's Tosca. It was a glorious production – fully staged and costumed – with a totally sold-out audience of over 500 people. And, while I am sure that experience will provide sermon fodder for a long time to come, I was witness to something that I have been almost bursting to tell you about.

Discipleship. In the gathering of a community of performers and an audience, I witnessed significant discipleship.

Maestro James Harp, the Artistic Director of the Maryland Opera (and Cantor for St. Mark's (Baltimore), for over 35 years!), is doing the work of

discipling a new generation of opera performers and opera lovers. With passion and energy, he has assembled strong partners in the Maryland Opera Board and Staff. He has invited generations of opera lovers to give generously to assure the future for the next generation of musicians and performers. He has personally mentored and raised up youth and young adults, and not just for the Maryland Opera – but often launching careers that take these talented and gifted musicians on adventures here and abroad.

Here is what I noticed from my time behind the scenes:

At 50, I was one of the oldest people in the cast. Mr. Harp is always raising up the next generation of performers, and the Maryland Opera gives some newcomers – and some emerging divas – a stage on which to perfect their art. It often starts with the Maryland Opera's Summer Opera Camp – where students get their first taste of learning and performing. Like Mother Goose calling her goslings, Mr. Harp (as everyone calls him) only needed say, "Ok young people, it's time for your stars to shine," and the "children's chorus" followed clear direction, sang a nearly flawless cantata, then a Te Deum, and basked in the applause of the audience – and the pride of their director, who praised them lavishly. It was beautiful to watch these students come alive under Mr. Harp's gentle leadership and obvious love.

All of the Chorus, that is the 20-somethings who played many parts, make their full-time learning and livelihood singing. While there was room in the cast for an amateur like me to play a part, the young men were all committed – heart, soul, and spirit – to making their art happen. I was amazed by their discipline and diligence to make the performance as perfect an offering as they could. Excellence was a word that they bantered about. And, as I sat in the dressing area waiting for my call, even as they obviously enjoyed each other's company, they were welcoming and genuinely interested in knowing more about what a bishop is. I

was amazed and honored by how they shared their faith journeys and struggles – and found that each one of them sings in a choir almost every Sunday! They told lots of stories about whom they had sung for before, the tales of harrowing performances, and quick escapes from sticky situations – but each of them made a point, when I told them that I belonged to Mr. Harp's church, to tell me how much they respected him – and more than that, how much they appreciated his respect. Mr. Harp called each of them "Mr. So and So" in every interaction, reminding them that they were professionals, and that he regarded them as colleagues.

Everyone's part is important. Mr. Harp creates and curates a culture of kindness and welcome. Following his example, the stars of the production – who came from many places and who have sung around the world – were a part of building up and encouraging the whole cast. I was on stage for less than 10 minutes, and yet I received the same words, shoulder touches, and "toi toi's" (the opera equivalent of "break a leg") on my way onto the stage and when I came off into the wings, as the divas did as they brought Tosca to life over the three hours of our production.

Leadership is being carefully and strategically passed to the next generation. When you look at the staff and leadership of the Maryland Opera, you will see that Mr. Harp has continued to raise up the next generation to lead – and not the way we've always done it, but with nimbleness and agility. He trusts his partners in this great undertaking, and they are fiercely loyal to the vision he has cast for a vital and robust opera community now, and for a long time to come.

It was a great experience for me to participate, but it was also a learning experience that gave me a glimpse of what the church could be if we were as passionate about tending the vision of beloved community and making disciples for Jesus – as my friend Mr. Harp is about the opera!
