For deliverance in the time of affliction, wrath, danger, and need, let us | pray to the Lord.


Lord, have mercy.

Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.




Go, My Children, with My Blessing

Gather Us In - Midweek Lent Series

Week 1- Gathering – "The Holy Spirit calls us together as the people of God." We have come broken and hurt longing to hear words of forgiveness and grace in the presence of others. We thank God and sing praise for God's goodness, asking to be renewed and reminded of God's call on our lives.

Week 2- Word – "God speaks to us in scripture reading, preaching, and song." We encounter a living word that is sent from God to God's people throughout many generations. We listen as the word comes from the mouths of lectors, preachers, and choir members, inspiring us to love as God has loved us in our daily lives.

Week 3- Meal – "God feeds us with the presence of Jesus Christ." We are a people who need to constantly be reminded by physical means of God's love and forgiveness. We hunger for that love and forgiveness and Jesus offers his very body and blood to nourish us belly and heart.

Week 4- Sending – "God blesses us and sends us in mission to the world." We are filled to overflowing body, heart, and mind with God's affirmations of love and forgiveness.
