A WORD FROM PASTOR MATT

This past Lent, we have been talking about the importance of creating sacred spaces that are welcoming to all people. We realize that we threw a lot of information at you all and it is going to take some time to digest, but I really hope that we can continue to talk and reflect on this subject matter for years to come. I concluded my final sermon in the series by telling a story that I wanted to reshare as a part of my newsletter article.

There was a guy who had these tattoos all over his body and spiky, orange mohawk hair. He started visiting churches and he walked in and most of the time the greeters would say "oh sir, you must be lost. Can we help you with directions to somewhere?" The man always wanted to say "Yeah I am lost. Can I find Jesus here?" But his fallback position was always to say, "Can you tell me where the closest Walmart is?" "Oh yeah, no problem" and they're very

nice. They took him outside. "Well, you just go down here. Hope you have a great day." One day, he ended up at a little, non-descript church parking lot with just a few cars on the lot. Not a lot going on. He walked through the door and these two little old lady greeters are there and they take one look at him and say, "young man your hair is on fire...Now young man, you go in there get some spiritual food. That's what you do and when you come out, we're gonna take you downstairs and give you some physical food. You're gonna love it." The man goes inside, the message was given and the worship experience comes to an end. Afterwards, they hunted him down and they say, "Now you come with us." They start to feed him like a king and put him up at a table. There's one young adult down there and the young lady whispers to the guy, "Can you go over and just say hi to him." The guy responds, "He scares me. I'm not going." The man has eaten his fill and is ready to head out and as he's going up the steps, the two little ladies come over and ask him, "Now what's your favorite pie?" "I don't know, I like blueberry pie and of course apple pie." He settles on apple pie. One of the ladies said to him, "Now, next week you come back here because she's gonna cook a pie and I'm gonna cook a pie and you're gonna tell us who has the best pie." In the meantime, he takes off all of the fake tattoos. He cleaned up his hair. He comes through the door and the same two greeters are standing there; they take one look at him and say, "What happened to you?" He said, "Yeah, I cleaned it up." They looked at him and say, "We liked the way you were, but we will take you as you are."

Truth be told, I got a little choked up at the end when I told that story because it reminded me of my home congregation and how they loved and treated me. For better or for worse, St. James played a major part in making me the pastor, father, and man that I am today. They were not perfect and in some ways, seeing their imperfections taught me what not to do. But one thing I will always remember was their encouragement. Mr. Bill, a member of St. James, taught me how to play the guitar for free. As I learned a new song, the congregation invited and encouraged me to play, even if it was a secular song. I played many of the Beatles' songs for the congregation, but they didn't seem to mind. They supported me and I never forgot that. Those ladies reminded me of the people of St. James. They took me for who I was and loved me. The moral of this story that I told was that we, as Christians, are called to take people as they are. We can encourage them where they need to go and guide them in their formation, but before we do any of that, let's start with taking people as they are.

We are by no means perfect and thank God for that because if we were perfect, we would never know what it means to be redeemed. Instead, lets spend this Easter season praying for God to send the Holy Spirit and guide us to where we need to go.

On Being the Church...

Interview of Dixie Shafer Eichelberger by Mary Ann Marcantonio



I met up with Dixie in her office at the cemetery building recently and I share with you what I learned about a woman whose faith is tried and survives. Her story, like the others before her, tell us how God walks besides us, both in good times and the worst of times.

Not many in our valley have the distinguished pedigree and can claim Middletown as their ancestral home; Dixie Shafer Eichelberger can. And that is not the only honor bestowed upon her, she is a direct descendant of a German immigrant, Conrad Crone, who arrived in Philadelphia on 17th of September 1738 on the ship, "Thistle." Mr. Crone, her 4th great-grandfather, so generously presented the early Lutherans of the valley the land our church sits on. Dixie's ancestors worshipped in the first building on this land, a log cabin circa 1783; the second church, a brick building of 1814; and the current building. Zion

didn't have a full time pastor until about 1796 mostly due to no parsonage. Conrad Crone donated that land to the church as well for the purpose of building a home for a pastor and his family. That first parsonage, built about 1798, still stands today on Washington Street, now a private residence.

Like the six generations before, Dixie's parents, Charles and June Shafer, brought her to Zion for baptism and was confirmed by Rev. Hoover on 30th May 1971. She recalls confirmation classes being held for two years when classes were offered on Wednesday evenings and Saturday mornings. As a confirmand, Dixie has one cherished memory that stands out, memorizing the names of the Books in the Bible, in order as they appear in the Sacred Book. This discipline learned has served her well over the years and she can easily find what Book she is searching for.

Dixie and her brother Joe, grew up under the shadow of Zion's steeple, literally, making their home at 204 West Main Street. Her youthful years were spent carefree and everything that any young person wanted she found right in town. Dixie attended Middletown schools and upon graduation she attended Frostburg College and finished with a degree to teach. But farming was her passion and she just couldn't see herself in a classroom; and she spent many years helping at the farms of the Burriers, Dick Ahalts, Brandenburgs and any other farmer who needed help. She loved her cows!

I asked Dixie to tell us something about herself that we might not know. Contrary to what many think, she can cook and crochet. She does cook for herself although not her favorite; she would always prefer to be outside either with animals or in her garden. Although she hasn't picked up a crochet hook in a few years she has no doubt that it would be easy enough to remember. So now you know the truth!


Having such an impressive lineage Dixie remains very humble. She follows the examples of her ancestors, if there is work to do for the kingdom of God, then get busy. Many don't know that Dixie maintains the

cemetery records. She meets with families, in their most desperate times, in preparation of the burial of their loved ones. She is not the first in her family to be a member of the Cemetery Board; her great grandfather, Samuel Grove Crone, also served on the board. Dixie credits Kenneth Reeder as her mentor who gave her the encouragement to take on a board position in 2002, in a very much man's world. She arranges the maintenance and care of the cemetery and its building and arranges the opening of graves when needed. She works with local youth organizations that place flags on the graves of our veterans. And if you're at the church on a morning of the week, you might see the cemetery gator outside the door with a very handsome and well behaved dog, Buddy, who patiently waits for his master's return. Dixie doesn't get too far without her sidekick!

"How has your faith served you Dixie?" Our faith sustains us every day as we face the blessings and challenges that life presents us. But it is in the face of tragedy that our faith either holds us up or we walk away from it. Dixie was faced with the unexpected and tragic death of her husband, Wyatt. They were coming home from a softball tournament in Virginia when a drunk tractor trailer driver lost control and hit the vehicle Wyatt was a passenger in. Dixie was in the car behind and saw the accident as it happened and never felt so helpless to protect the one she loved. A marriage of eight years had tragically ended, a heart broken 34 year old widow faced the rest of her life alone, mourning the loss of her Wyatt and all the lost dreams of their future. Anger consumed her and over time God has granted her peace and comfort. It is the ever present loving God and the love of her church family that held her up in those early days and she credits Pastor Turley and Ruth Miller as the pillars of faith that were her strength and who she could lean on for support. Dixie has learned that it is through her pain and loss that she can be God's instrument in bringing healing to others who face the similar sting of death of a loved one. It is no surprise that the "face" of Zion's Cemetery is one who knows the gentle and caring path in which the grieving must walk. Dixie also has turned her pain into a ministry called "Hope to Faith" helping others to navigate the dark days of grief with the hope of learning to live with grief. This group meets on the last Monday of the month and she invites anyone to join who looks for healing.

"What do you miss about the years passed?" Living on the main street here in Middletown for 65 years, she misses the quiet, laid back town she fondly remembers. She grew up at 204 Main Street and shortly after she and Wyatt were married they bought the home next door at 206. Now the street has a constant flow of traffic, and the noise and the loss of the nostalgia of a small town add to the longing for the "good old days." Looking for a more peaceful and tranquil life, Dixie left Main Street for more peaceful days in the countryside. As life slows down, Dixie still enjoys the fellowship while helping the Ruritan Club when they do butchering and the preparing of apple butter which has been a financial blessing to the church treasury over the years. This fall marks the 40th anniversary of the tradition of making apple butter which Dixie has helped nearly every year. The social aspect of this custom has left fond memories of the saints that have met their heavenly reward. Even though these social events, are as enjoyable, she still looks forward to the solitude of working in her garden. But her greatest loss is her father, who was the greatest man she has ever known and who had the most influence on her life.

So, what's been happening?



Stop the Bleed Class

The Safety and Security Ministry Team from time to time holds special trainings for all members in order to be able to handle an emergency at Zion. At the beginning of April, we welcomed Brunswick Volunteer Ambulance and Rescue to Zion to lead a nationwide class called Stop the Bleed. It was very informative and we really appreciated our trainer taking the time to show us how to prevent someone from bleeding out in an emergency. We are hoping to offer another CPR/First Aid training this fall.

Confirmation Class Silliness

On the first Sunday of every month, our confirmation class gathers to talk about faith and Jesus. In February, we were talking about the Lord's Prayer and we got to the fourth petition (Give us today our daily bread) and how God gives us all that we have. To drive that point home, we did a skit called "The Rat Race" which describes two lab rats. One of them has realized that if he pushes the button, a scientist will give him a snack. This rat assumes that he is making the food every time he pushes the button, when in reality, he is just pushing a button. It was a good conversation to talk about God giving us that daily bread and explaining what that daily bread is according to Luther's explanation.



Video Feed in the Nursery

If you do not know, the Welcome and Engagement ministry team did a makeover of our nursery room. They painted, cleaned out the toys, acquired new furniture, added some artwork and added a TV so that we could have a video feed of the worship service. However, getting that live feed to the TV has posed some challenges and high cost. Thankfully, Pastor Matt specializes in getting square pegs to fit into round holes and he figured out a way to use Zoom and a \$140 micro-computer to make it all work. Now if you need to utilize our nursery, you can not only hear the service, but see it on the big screen. In the coming months, we plan to rededicate this space. 


Science experiments in Sunday School?!?!

The Three Days—Holy Week 2025

Maundy Thursday

Holy Week is unique in that it takes three days to tell the story of God overcoming the grave. Part 1 began on Maundy Thursday. We gathered downstairs for dinner prepared by the Council.

Afterwards, we made our way upstairs for worship. Maundy



Thursday is the weirdest of the Three Days in that the focus is on the last commandments that our Lord gave the Church: Confession and Forgiveness, Foot Washing, and Holy Communion. Most of us don't like to have our feet touched but the command from our Lord is clear: "Unless you wash one another's feet, you have no share with me." In most traditional Maundy Thursday services, you would simply focus on the three commands or mandatumes, but we know people experience things differently and learn through

different means. So we again utilized different stations where people could explore and experience during the washing of feet. These stations included a sensory table, coloring station, journaling station, and prayer and anointing station. It is a weird service but it is in these weird moments that God tends to show up. The liturgy ended with the Stripping of the Altar which lead us into part 2.









Good Friday

Good Friday's focus is on reading the Passion according to St. John, prayer, and reflection. What is unique about our liturgy is that it is mostly led by the congregation as a reminder that we all are active participants in the Passion. Our Good Friday liturgy is steeped in old traditions dating back to the 3rd and 4th centuries. The service begins with a large candle being carried in but hidden throughout the liturgy. It is brought back into the sanctuary and left on the altar near the cross at the end. The words, "We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you. For by your holy Cross you have redeemed the world." remind us of the hope that still is to come on Easter. The Good Friday liturgy doesn't end on a note of despair but on hope. A single lit, which has been hidden since the beginning of the service, is brought back out to remind us that God's light still shines in the darkness and that we have one more part of the story, remaining to be told.



Easter Vigil

On Saturday night, in joyful expectation we gathered to join in a tradition that dates back to the first century—the Easter Vigil. On the night before Easter, the Church would gather to read scripture starting at Genesis 1 to hear the salvific story of God. The liturgy moves from one location to another and along the way, we follow the Pascal Candle. Eventually, we made our way back to the Sanctuary and joyfully proclaimed, "Alleluia, Christ is risen!"

Easter Morning

Almost 400 people joined us on Easter Sunday to shout Alleluia and praise God for the gift of the resurrection. Our Christian Fellowship Ministry provided a breakfast of coffee and items that could be eaten in the Social Room or taken togo, but we were delighted to see so many people stay and join in conversation with one another. We had two great worship services on Easter morning. Matt and the Worship Team sang their hearts out to a packed congregation. The Orchestra, Hand Bells, and Choir sounded fantastic as always. Thank you to everyone who made Easter Sunday so special!









Community Easter Egg Hunt

On April 19, a silly little rabbit left a bunch of Easter Eggs all around our campus, but thankfully, a bunch of eager volunteers showed up to clean them all up. And you know we could not only do a massive Easter Egg hunt...We also had snack station, crafts to make, popcorn to eat, story time, and a community service station where we put together baggies of hygiene supplies donated by Zion to the Middletown Valley Food Bank.





Your Heart, Your Hands.

You have a heart for service, and the work of your hands is a blessing.

GHM's hands-on projects are a meaningful way to make a difference in the world. Our partners have asked for these specific items - they will be joyfully received overseas. Once delivered to GHM's warehouse in Minnesota, these projects are shipped by container along with vital medical supplies and equipment also requested by our partners.



Rolled Bandages Project

Mission hospitals and rural clinics are the frontline for healthcare for millions of people across the globe. Most lack even the most basic supplies, including bandages, and many have little or no access to clean water. Sterilization is difficult and it can be a challenge to have enough clean bandages for daily patient care. GHM rolled bandages help meet that need. Although most often used for wound care, the bandages can be useful in other ways at hospitals and clinics where resources are scarce. GHM rolled bandages have been spotted holding an IV in place, and tying up broken surgical lights. By the end of 2023 GHM had sent almost 2,800,000 bandages to international partners - that's more than 3,100 miles of bandages!

How can you get involved?

Please donate any used laundered white sheets to Zion and place them in the labeled bin located in the Quilters area. The sheets will be cut into long strips and then rolled using a handmade crank rolling machine. Various groups at Zion will be participating in this mission project.


Creating Sacred Spaces
