A WORD FROM PASTOR DIANE

What keeps you going? I mean, when you want to give up and you have tried and tried and tried to change or do something, and all you want to do is give it all up but you keep trying. Is it because people are counting on you? Is it because it means a lot to you. Is it because you know you're doing the right thing? There are lots of reasons that we keep doing things. The most important thing when we feel like giving up is remembering the "why"- why are we doing this. This of course isn't anything you haven't heard before. Sometimes though we each need a reminder to stop and remember why we are doing something in the midst of our fatigue and feeling of giving up.

Periodically you have heard me say in worship why we have come to this place: to meet the living God, to hear words of forgiveness, to learn of God's love that we might go out from this place to do just these same things we have learned.

The Church is an imperfect place because she is made up of people. Any time people get together there will be disagreement, different visions, and hurt feelings. That is especially hard with the church as the church should be better as followers of Jesus, right? We should be striving to get along and make sure that everyone feels included and agrees. Yet Jesus always knew we were never going to be perfect and get along. He knew our human hearts and minds.

Yet for all her and our imperfections, the church can be a tool for God's love to work. She is constantly in need of reforming and forgiving and growing into who God has created her to be. We, as a part of her, each are in need of reforming and forgiving and growing into who God has created us to be. What makes us different than any other social group is that we are called despite our differences to be united in Christ who has died that our shortcomings in community can be forgiven and we can continue to keep trying to live into the love of God that God first showed us.

Some days, it would be easy to give up on the church. Who needs one more commitment




or argument? Who needs one more meeting? Why do we keep on coming back? Because the church is a special place where we meet the living God. It's a place where we practice being God's people imperfectly but are reminded of who God has called us and is forming us to be. It's a place where we come to grow in relationship with God and with one another as we learn about God and God's love for this world.

Friends, don't give up. Remember why you are here. Share your "why" with someone you love. Write it down, or pray and talk to God about it to recommit yourself to this relationship with God and with others. Your presence and part in making up the body of Christ is important for this world God so loves.

A WORD FROM PASTOR MATT

I saw the sign on Instagram the other day that read, "I didn't say that." The quote was attributed to Jesus. It's kind of a humorous sign, but I think it holds a lot of relevance for us today 2000 years post Christendom world.

Many of us have probably seen the bibles that have the red letters that highlight words spoken by Jesus. The red letters are both good and bad. They're good in the fact that they really do highlight the words that Jesus spoke while he was with us on earth and that his followers recorded many years later. The bad is that this seems to say that Jesus doesn't speak anymore. Even though Jesus lives with the Father in heaven, he remains mute. Is God still speaking to us? Is Jesus still speaking to us?

I think the answer to that question is yes, but over the years I've become increasingly worried by what some Christians think Jesus is saying. When I was younger, it was all the rage to wear these rubber bracelets with the letters WWJD? Which meant what would Jesus do? The problem is we don't know what Jesus would do in that moment because Jesus is not here telling us exactly what he would do. Instead, we usually have a lot of faith leaders making grandstand claims that Jesus would do this and Jesus would do that. As I mature in my faith, I think the real question to ask is what has Jesus done? Because we might not know what Jesus would


do, but we certainly know what he has done. Knowing that information helps us to postulate what Jesus would truly do in the moment.

However, we

shouldn't be so foolish to think the answers to what would Jesus do could be something that is easily answered overnight or in 140 characters on Twitter. It took the church centuries of prayer and consideration before officially establishing the biblical canon. It took centuries and numerous church councils to develop the Nicene Creed. Instant gratification when it comes to what would Jesus have us do is not a thing. It takes time and cannot be done alone.

Jesus never intended his followers

to be alone. Personal faith and personal savior are falsehoods. Scripture, while it can be read in private, was meant to be explored together because left to our own devices, we all would come up with different interpretations as to what Jesus would have us do. Instead, we are called to explore these things together in community with one another. The pandemic changed our view of community and how we do community, but there is power in being able to come together whether in person through



am glad that you are part of this community. Our community here is made up people who

come from all different backgrounds and generations. The church remains one of the last remaining intergenerational communities left in our world today. We all have a place around the table as we explore the answers to these age old questions what would Jesus have us do and what is Jesus saying to us today. May Jesus be with us in our exploring, but more important, correct when we misquote him.




Take me out to Ball Game!





Being the Church...

M. Lee Ropp interviewed by Mary Ann Marcantonio



Sunday Church School Superintendent M. Lee Ropp

As the demographics of the church have changed over the years, Lee is a rare breed. He was baptized, confirmed, married at Zion. He was one of six children; four sisters and a brother who had died shortly before he was born. Lee has three sons, Rick, Kevin and Brian who grew up and began their faith journey at Zion; and Lee has eight grandchildren, and three great grandchildren and spoils all of them . Sadly, after a long bout with cancer, his wife of more than 46 years, Dorthalee, passed away in 1999.

Lee grew up on a farm north of Middletown where he was expected to help with the daily chores. As a young person, Lee was a member of Luther League, a youth organization here at the church, and he remembers that on one occasion, they had an event at Braddock for swimming. He took the trolley up to Braddock and back to Middletown at the end of the event. This was the only time he took the trolley.

During World War II, the family had no TV like most families, but they relied on radio for information. Lee remembers hearing the voice of

Walter Cronkite as he reported from Europe of the war efforts. He remembers the black out practices, which required all residences and businesses to turn off all lights that would enable enemy aircraft to identify population centers. No streetlights or neon signs, no flashlights or car headlights were allowed and drapes were required to cover windows.

While still in high school, Lee was appointed Assistant Superintendent of Zion's Sunday School in September 1952 and by 1962, upon the retirement of George Carlton Rhoderick, Jr, Lee began serving the congregation as the General Superintendent of Sunday School. His leadership gifts began before he even graduated from high school as he was the president of his class and president of Future Farmers of America. Lee in his most humble way acknowledged that he was voted in because no one else wanted it. I'm afraid not, Lee, you were selected to serve because you were devoted to getting a job done.

What is something about Lee that many of us do not know? The answer was unexpected...He is ordained in the state of Pennsylvania to perform weddings. He had gone through the online training so that he could be the officiant at the wedding of his granddaughter. What grandparents will do for their family!

Lee's faith was influenced by the former Pastor McCarney, who served Zion from 1951-1957. McCarney confirmed him, married Dorthalee and him and baptized their first son. This relationship lasted for many years even after the McCarney's left the parsonage for a new call.

If Lee could turn back the clock to a specific time it would be before the 'Blue Laws' came to an end. It was a time when families gathered at church instead of running off to the malls.

He has remained close to some of his dearest friends by sharing "a no cook meal" every Thursday evening. I think this is the secret to his youthfulness. Hey Lee, how does one get on this list?

I could have done this article without an interview because you can't help but notice how he is always

there with a helping hand and a smile. Lee's life is an example of John 13:35 says, "By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." He has and is serving the church and community through lifelong acts of kindness to anyone who is in need. Besides being superintendent of Sunday School for over 50 years, he has been a godly influence on so many youth in our church by chaperoning our youth on 12 workcamps, a volunteer at Safe House for many years (an after school program for middle school kids), the hot dog chef for VBS, and a constant presence at Mar-Lu-Ridge with his paintbrush in hand (if it is wood and has paint on it, chances are Lee painted it). He has also donated countless pints of blood to the American Red Cross, served as a driver for elderly people (many of them now are younger than him) to doctor appointments, and has done many projects on houses of those who cannot do for themselves. The list is endless because if there is a need, Lee is there. Now, age is catching up to him and the cane is his new sidekick. He moves a little slower but, still finds ways to serve his church and community. He is an example to all of us of what worship truly should be.

The take-a-away from my time listening to Lee is "We are the church... The living stones that worship and praise God through our acts of service." Worship is more than just attending church on Sunday, although it is a very important part of our Christian life. It is too easy to say "I am busy" or any other excuse that may pop up. Real worship involves what Paul writes in Romans, "to present your bodies as a living sacrifice," and the Holy Spirit empowers us to offer our lives back to God...this means you are led to share love, joy, peace, patience, goodness, kindness and more with others. All of our life is an act of worship and too often it reveals who and what we worship. Reflecting on Lee's well-lived life, each act of service is worship and a stone



building up the Spiritual house of Christ. What stone is God putting before you today and how will you use it as a living sacrifice?
