Understanding the Paschal Season

Any story about God is a story about the cross. This includes the nativity, the epiphany narrative, the wedding at Cana, the miracles, the teachings, as well as the passion. These stories all point us to the crucified and risen Christ. This season of Easter is when we fully immerse ourselves into the Paschal Mystery. The Paschal Candle will remain front and center at the altar throughout Easter (the paschal season) as a reminder to everyone that our Lord is present and that this is a special time in the church.

But why doesn't the Paschal Candle remain at the altar after Easter? Once we move ourselves out of full immersion of the paschal season and into the season of ordinary time, it is at this time that we move the candle to the place where the Paschal Mystery is made most evident—baptism. In baptism, we are linked to our Lord's death and resurrection. As St. Paul reminds us in Romans 6: If we have been united in a death like his, we shall certainly be united in a resurrection like his. Therefore, we place the Paschal Candle near the font as a reminder to everyone of this holy promise given to us in baptism and we light the Paschal Candle to remind us of the Paschal season. The Paschal Candle is also lit at funerals. At a funeral, the candle is placed near the coffin as a reminder to everyone in the congregation of the Paschal Mystery: that because of the deceased's baptism, he or she is linked to our Lord's death and in turn, linked to our Lord's resurrection. We light the Paschal Candle at these moments (and these moments alone) as a reminder of the Paschal Mystery that we are brought into through baptism.

What is the Paschal Mystery? During the season of Easter, we will come back to the topic of the Paschal Mystery. "The Paschal Mystery is a real event that occurred in our history, but it is unique: all other historical events happen once, and then they pass away, swallowed up in the past. The Paschal Mystery of Christ, by contrast, cannot remain only in the past because by his death, he destroyed death, and all that Christ is - all that he did and suffered for all of

humanity - participates in the divine eternity, and so transcends all times while being made present in them all. The event of the Cross and Resurrection abides and draws everything toward life. Christian liturgy not only recalls the events that saved us but actualizes them, makes them present. The Paschal Mystery of Christ is celebrated, not repeated. It is the celebrations that are repeated, and in each celebration, there is an outpouring of the Holy Spirit that makes the unique mystery present” (Taken from www.vatican.va/archive/ccc_css/archive/catechism/p2s1c1a1.htm#1085). Simply put, what we do here in worship is the Paschal Mystery and the best to begin understand the Paschal Mystery is to be present in worship. Easter last 50 days because one day cannot contain the entire Paschal Mystery. Today begins the journey.

The Church Year is not a walk-through of Christ's life, but an ordered, open exploration of the effects of Christ's presence. This is important to remember—that what we do the rest of the year matters. The entire church year points us to the cross of Christ. Even on days such as Reformation Sunday and Christmas morning, the crucified and risen Christ must be proclaimed by the faithful gathered in Holy worship.

Today, we will begin this 50 day journey of rediscovering the Paschal Mystery and its joy. The great fast of Lent is over. Our Lord, who has been crucified, has been raised from the dead. It might sound silly to say week after week, “Alleluia! Christ is Risen. He is risen indeed. Alleluia!” but it is because of this truth, death has lost the war, Satan has lost his grip on humanity, and the world will never be the same again. **Alleluia! Christ is risen!!! He is risen indeed. Alleluia!**
